FIRST AID BOOK SUGGESTIONS

1. International medical guide for ships: including the ship's medicine chest

The International Medical Guide for Ships shows designated first-aid providers how to diagnose, treat, and prevent the health problems of seafarers on board ship. Since its first publication in 1967, the International Medical Guide for Ships has been a standard reference for medical care on board ships.

This, the third edition, contains fully updated recommendations aimed to promote and protect the health of seafarers, and is consistent with the latest revisions of both the WHO Model List of Essential Medicines and the International Health Regulations. The International Labour Organizations Maritime Labour Convention 2006 stipulates that all ships shall carry a medicine chest, medical equipment and a medical guide. The International Medical Guide for Ships supports a main principal of that convention; to ensure that seafarers are given health protection and medical care as comparable as possible to that which is generally available to workers ashore. By carrying this guide on board ships, and following its instructions, countries can both fulfil their obligations under the terms of the Maritime Labour Convention 2006, and ensure the best possible health outcomes for their seafaring population.

COURSES

RYA First Aid at Sea Course

The course is designed to provide a working knowledge of first aid for skippers of small craft working within 60 miles of a safe haven. The syllabus is based on the recommendations of the Health and Safety Executive and the Department of Transport.

Upon successful completion of the course, a RYA First Aid Certificate is issued valid for three years. This certificate fulfils the requirements of the Department of Transport Code of Practice for Small Commercial Vessels in area category 2, **Training centre** 3 & 4.

Satellite telephone -- DSC Radio (medical PAN PAN) to call for help



NURSE, are my TESTICLES BLACK?

This was a patient asking his nurse, are my tests back?

And she took the question the wrong way because of distortions in the voice, in this case, because of mouth surgery!

So be aware of the need for careful, slow, distinct speech when talking to emergency services over VHF Radio.

For Short trips

When the yacht is no more than 30 hours from the shore, a few simple things might suffice.

- 1. **Asthma:** is frightening, and a Ventolin inhaler very helpful.
- 2. **Sea Sickness:** Stugeron *gotas* are very useful with acute vomiting as it is absorbed through the lining of the mouth.
- 3. **Diabetic coma:** is very frightening, and a few glucose sweets can be useful when there has been overdose of hypo glycaemic medication.
- 4. **Good analgesics:** can be very helpful for minor injuries, as are a few large plasters and crepe bandages.
- 5. **Burns:** carry fucidin tulle / sofratulle; and sterile gauze squares, crepe bandages.
- 6. **Hysteria/acute anxiety:** Valium 5mg.
- 7. Diarrhoea: Imodium, ciproxin
- 8. **Acute indigestion:** Omeprazole 40mg
- 9. Infections: Cough, sore throat, boils, herpes vesicles, urinary infection. Carry Multistix for testing urine, Herpid cream for cold sores. Amoxil/ Augmentin/Keflacin/Erythromycin/ciprofloxacina.
- 10. **Sunburn:** Caladryl /Calomine cream, Savlon/E45 cream.
- 11. Sinusitis: Nasal Pain
- 12. Otrivine: Nasal drops.

JOINTS & FRACTURES

Plaster of Paris bandages AND THE NEW PLASTER PADS/MATS THAT YOU SOAK, MAKE PLIABLE AND MOULD ROUND THE FRACTURE AND FIX WITH CREPE BANDAGES. SAM finger splints.

Stockinette tubular bandages in small and large sizes Stockinette applicators.

Dealing with PAIN (centrally active or peripheral acting agents) **Central/acting on the brain**

PSYCHOSIS, Hysteria/Delusions of Grandeur/Neurosis

Largactil and Valium tabs Depixol tabs and ampules for injection and in desperation 4 meters of bondage line?

DENTAL

Oil of cloves Snub nosed pliers

HEART/HYPERTENSION/CIRCULATION/RESPIRATORY DIFFICULTY

Stethoscope Sphygmanometer and now APPS on smart phones Brook air-way Thermometers - oral-rectal Emergency reflective blanket

Multistick urinary diagnostic sticks. Ventolin inhaler Losarten (or similar) Hypotensive agent (includes Viagra) Arrhythmias Inderal 10ml.



DIABETIC COMA

Glucostix urinary sticks Glucagon for injection or glucose sweets Use patients own blood glucose sticks and hypoglycemic tablets/Insulin

URINARY/PROSTAIC OBSTRUCTION

Foley catheter silicone 16FR KY Jelly lubricant (many emergency uses) with or without lignocaine

SEX AS AN EMERGENCY NEED

Condoms

" Already have KY jelly and Viagra for lowering blood pressure/ and contraceptive pills; Zovirax cream for Herpes simplex of genitalia. For unwanted/ unprotected sex , 5 contraceptive pills a day for 4 days should bring on a period.

INFECTIONS

Viral

RELENZA for coryza and flu type viruses. Night nurse caps.

Bacterial

Broad spectrum Amoxil 500 tds+30 /Augmentine(check about penicillin allergy) Ciproxin 500mg tds. +30 Urinary infection! Acute gastro enteritis (look at the urine) Use the Ciproxin with Imodium for diarrhea. Senokot for constipation Appendicitis/infected sea-urchin spines use Ciproxin Chest infections/ also Klaricid, and tetracycline

GASTRITIS

Omeprazole caps for acute acid/gastritis Gaviscon gel Milk STEMETIL for injection for vomiting Gottas of Sturgeon (cinnarizine) for sea sickness, to drop on to the tongue

HAEMORRHOIDS



Anusol HC cream and suppositories

OVERDOSE of DRUGS and SHOCK

Drip tubes and cannula, and bottles of isotonic saline. Prednisilone 10mg tabs

SORE THROAT

Lozenges: Rum and blackcurrant / Day and night nurse.
